# Federation University Australia Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF) 2024 Allocation Report

The Higher Education Support (Student Services, Amenities, Representation and Advocacy) Guidelines 2022 require higher education providers to provide a publicly available report on student services and amenities fee (SSAF) allocations and actual expenditure for the year as part of their annual reporting and in the form approved by the Minister. This SSAF Allocation Report is the form approved by the Minister.

Additional reporting was introduced to allow for greater transparency and consistency in SSAF allocations and expenditure.

Please note, the information provided in this SSAF Allocation Report does **not** require auditing by a financial accountant. The SSAF <u>expenditure reporting remains unchanged</u>, more information can be found in the <u>Financial Statements Guidelines</u> for Table A and B providers, and in the <u>Financial</u> <u>Viability Instructions: Applicants and Providers of FEE-HELP (FVI)</u> for all other approved providers.

### SSAF Consultation and Achievements

In 2024 Federation University continued to prioritise student voice in our decision-making and service design. A key mechanism for this is through the Student Senate, our peak representative student body. Meeting 8 times annually, the Student Senate serves as a vital channel for meaningful consultation and collaboration between students and the University. The Student Senate contributes valuable insights and input on a range of student-related matters, with particular focus on:

- The quality, accessibility and relevance of student services and amenities
- University policies and processes that impact student life
- The physical, cultural and digital environments that shape student learning and engagement

A core responsibility of the Student Senate is to provide recommendations on the allocation of the Student Services and Amenities Fee (SSAF). This includes consultation on how SSAF funds are utilised to best support the student community.

In 2024, SSAF funds were allocated to the following student-facing services, projects, and activities:

- Student Orientation, Transition, and Retention Activities across all campuses and virtually to support new and continuing students including Student Events and Activities to enhance retention, success, and connection among students.
- Sport and Fitness Programs including opportunities for students to participate in events, activities community and representative sporting programs. Also includes provision of equipment, uniforms and support for elite student athletes
- Support for Student Groups and Clubs with assistance and funding for groups and their activities across all campuses and virtually.
- Improvement and Maintenance of Student Amenities including student social spaces and lounges.
- Student Senate support included induction, training, promotion, merchandise, and representative stipends as well as executive support
- Careers and Employment Programs and Services including careers advisor appointments, webinars and workshops, career resources, Federation Advantage Program and the Mentor Advantage Program.
- Student Advocacy Service including the provision of independent, confidential advice and support to students dealing with academic concerns, appeals, and complaints.

Student feedback and input on SSAF priorities is also gathered through our annual Student Life Survey, where students share ideas and preferences for SSAF-funded events, programs, and services. Insights from this survey directly inform initiatives including out Student Events Calendar. ensuring SSAF allocation reflects students' evolving interests and needs.

We also run an Early Semester Pulse Survey — a short check-in designed to identify students who may be at risk of disengaging from their studies. This proactive approach enables early connection, timely support, and targeted interventions. It also gives students a voice in shaping their experience by asking what's working well and what could be improved.

<sup>1</sup> Note: As per Part 2 of the *Higher Education Support (Administration) Guidelines 2022* (Administration Guidelines), students studying on a part-time basis must not be charged more than 75 per cent of the maximum SSAF that a higher education provider determines for students studying on a full-time basis. The term "part-time basis" means a study load of less than 75 per cent of the normal full-time student load for the period to which the fee relates. As per part 7 of the Administration Guidelines, the normal EFTSL value for a full-time student studying over a period of one year is 1.0.

<sup>2</sup> Note: As per Part 2 of the Administration Guidelines, a higher education provider may choose to determine a different SSAF for particular categories of persons, including a zero amount.

<sup>3</sup> Note: Students are categorised as full-time or part-time students based on the total EFTSL value of the units of study they undertook in [insert reported year]. For example, a student undertook a full-time study load in Semester 1 which was equal to 0.5 EFTSL and undertook a part-time study load in Semester 2 which was equal to 0.375 EFTSL. This student would be categorised as a full-time student in [insert reported year] as the total EFTSL they undertook in [insert reported year] was equal to 0.875.
