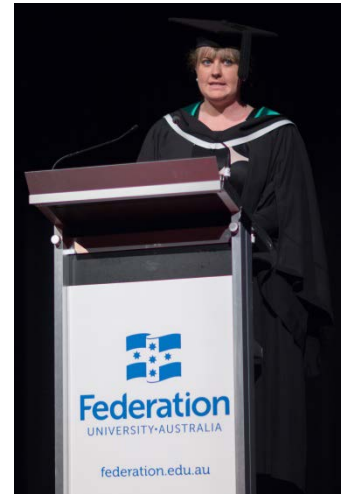


## Graduate Speech – Laura Gillett
